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Introduction

The FDC agent version 4 requires visual label formatting to be specified using HTML. This has the advantage of allowing for more detailed and nuanced customisations of headers, footers, and watermarks. Administrators can create simple labels that incorporate the tags that users want to apply, or they can create more complex, multiline labels that are required by some regulatory regimes.

Adding Labels

Labels are entered in the associated text boxes for the MS Office plugins (Excel, Outlook, PowerPoint, & Word) in the FDC UI.

Example for MS Word header below:

There are three types of labels: headers, footers, and watermarks. Each is configured similarly in the administrator UI but applied differently to the end user document. Headers are applied to the top of a page, footers to the bottom, and watermarks are placed diagonally across the background of the document.

Creating Labels

i All visual labels must start with and end with .

i Tags such as Classification and Compliance, must be entered as {classification} and {compliance}

The below example shows the following header: span>Classification: {classification} +
Compliance: {compliance}/span>, added and a Word file with Highly Confidential and GDPR data given the
correct header.

Styling & Formatting Labels

i Styles and formats must be added using inline CSS or HTML tags

Text Colour

Add text colours using the CSS color attribute. You can choose to use a hex code or HTML colour names.

Default is Black if no colour style is added

Font

Add the font you want to use with the font-family CSS attribute.

Classification: {classification}

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To apply more than one style, the different attributes must separate by a semi-colon:

Classification: {classification}

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Default is Calibri if no font-family is added

To style specific text parts, add tags.

In this example, only "classification" gets coloured, while all text uses Calibri.

Remember to close each tag.

Other style attributes that can be used are background-color, font-size, and text-align.

Text Formatting

To apply text styles like bold, italic, underline, or strike-through, use the respective tags:

, , <u>, and <s>.

These require matching opening and closing tags, like :

{classification}

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i Close tags in reverse order opened, e.g., Correct is right, but Incorrect is wrong.

Line Breaks

To split labels into multiple lines, use the
 tag for line breaks. Unlike other tags,
 doesn't need a closing tag. Example: Line 1
Line 2

Supported Styles/Tags Table

i Only these specific styles/tags are recognised; other are ignored and could cause issues.
